Smart At It (SAI) is committed to using customer, user, and website visitor data in a responsible manner

Anyone can visit smartatitacademy.com generally without identifying themselves or giving us any personal information.

However, there are times when we do need to collect data from our visitors. For instance, we anonymously aggregate the total number of visits to our website. We in no manner link this aggregate data to individual information.

SAI may utilize information about you or your visit for research purposes or to tweak our website and the services we provide.

We might also employ it to keep in touch with you via email or other channels (to send you new information or notification of special offers). Please let us know if you do not want to receive this information by calling 747.322.3029 Ext. 5 or sending an email to contact@smartatitacademy.com.

The user remains anonymous even though IP addresses are logged to track user sessions. We may examine this information for trends and statistics, such as the pages that users are visiting and the length of time they spend there on our website. Your IP address is not connected to anything that may be used to personally identify you.

Cookies are text files that are stored on your device when you visit our website. This makes it possible for us to better understand the traffic to our site and helps you have a more customized user experience.

Smart At IT Academy (SAI) gathers personal information for paying, communicating with parents and guardians, and improving your services. There is no sale of it to outside parties. Any information you provide to SAI is solely for internal use. You may only obtain this information by requesting it and providing identification from the government or a state. To help ensure that your data is not abused or disclosed, and is only accessed by authorized personnel as part of their job obligations, internal procedures and controls have been put in place.

ONLY: According to Nevada's Consumer Privacy Act, individuals have the right to refuse to have personal data sold to third parties through websites, and the Attorney General is empowered to impose penalties on businesses and organizations who disobey this request.



Passed in May 2019 and became effective on October 1 of the same year

By granting residents of the state the ability to refuse to have their personal information sold, the amendment ([NV SB220](#)) increases privacy protections in Nevada.

The amendment's main focus is the right to opt-out, making it the most crucial factor for Nevada websites to take into account

Even though the European General Data Protection Regulation and California's privacy law are significantly more comprehensive than Nevada's, this only slightly moves Nevada's privacy law closer to them.

Who is protected by the Nevada privacy law?

The "covered information" of Nevada citizens is protected by the state's privacy statute.

The Nevada privacy law deals with "covered information," which is defined as "any one or more of the following personally identifiable information about a consumer collected by an operator through an Internet website or online service," as opposed to the [CCPA](#) and [GDPR's](#) "personal information" clauses.

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The concept of sale and the [Nevada privacy law](#)

The term "sale" is defined as "the exchange of covered information for monetary consideration by the operator to a person for the person to license or sell the covered information to further individuals" in Section 1.6 of the Nevada privacy legislation. This means that under Nevada's privacy law, only the actual sale of personal information to third parties—that is, the exchange of money—is regarded as a sale. Additionally, there are five exclusions to the definition of "selling" in the Nevada privacy statute.
